

In 1980 Worcester's population reached its lowest point in second half of the twentieth century. Between 1980 and 2010, the population increased by almost 20,000, or 11.9%.

Compared to selected cities of similar size in the United States with emphasis on the New England region, Worcester had the 3rd highest rate of population growth between 2000 and 2010. In New England, Worcester had the 2nd highest rate of growth. Boston's population growth was 4.83%, slightly less than Worcester's.



Since 2000, Worcester has added 8,307 housing units, an increase of 11.75%. At the same time the average size of households has decreased by 1%.



Worcester's racial breakdown has changed since 2000. The number of people who identify as white has decreased by 5.57%, while the number of people who identify as African American has increased by more than 77% and the Asian population has increased by 31%. The Latino population has increased by almost 45%.¹





LINGUISTIC ISOLATION³






Between 2000 and 2010, the number of linguistically isolated households increased for all languages spoken in Worcester.





Language Spoken at Home by Population Age 5+







Since 2000, the number of households speaking a language other than English has increased by 20.6% (9,357 people). Spanish households have increased by the greatest number: 26%, or 5,583. The greatest percentage increase has been in the category of "other languages": 68% or 2,419. There has also been an increase in the number of people who speak English "Less than Very Well".


A slight majority of Worcester's population is under 34 years of age. Worcester has the third-highest population of 20-34 year olds of the major cities in New England.

Between 2000 and 2010 the number of adults aged 25+ who have less than a high-school diploma decreased by 28.92%. Adults in the same age group have seen an overall increase in their level of education, with the number of high-school graduates increasing by 5.35%, with bachelor's degrees increasing by 38.34%, and with graduate or professional degrees increasing by 23.31%.



WORCESTER'S HISTORIC UNEMPLOYMENT TREND





The unemployment rate among age groups is highest for those between the ages of 16 and 19 at 26.3%. Among racial groups, unemployment is highest for American Indian and Alaska Natives at 19%, followed by those of Hispanic or Latino origin at 15.8%. The unemployment rate among men, 8.5%, is higher than among women, 7.3%.

Between 2000 and 2010, the number of households making \$49,999 or less decreased by 13.9%, while all households making \$50,000 or more increased by 40.6%. There has been little to no change in the number of households making \$10,000 to \$14,999 and \$50,000 to \$74,999 between 2000 and 2010.

DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED IN REPORT

- 1. <u>US CENSUS</u>: The U.S. Census counts every resident in the United States. It is mandated by Article I, Section 2 of the Constitution and takes place every 10 years. The data collected by the decennial census determine the number of seats each state has in the U.S. House of Representatives and is also used to distribute federal funds to states and local communities. For the 2010 Census, approximately 74 percent of households returned their census forms by mail; the remaining households were counted by census workers walking neighborhoods throughout the United States.
- 2. AMERICAN COMMUNITY SURVEY (ACS) is an ongoing survey that provides data every year -- giving communities current information to plan investments and services. Information from the survey generates data that help determine how more than \$400 billion in federal and state funds are distributed each year. Since ACS uses sample sizes each year, there is a large margin of error for each data point. However, five-year data are an aggregate of the data collected, and thus have a smaller margin of error than shorter-term reports.
- 3. <u>UNEMPLOYMENT TERMS</u> (from the Bureau of Labor Statistics)
 - a. Employed: People are employed if they did any work for pay or profit during the week they are surveyed, if they did at least 15 hours of unpaid work at a family owned enterprise, operated by someone in their household, and if they were temporarily absent from their regular jobs because of temporary illness, vacation, industrial disputes, or various personal reasons, whether or not they were paid for their time off or not.
 - b. Unemployed: People are counted as unemployed if they did not work for pay or profit during the survey week, made at least one active attempt to find a job in the previous four weeks, and were currently available for work (minus temporary illness). They are also counted as unemployed even if they are actively seeking employment but are currently waiting for a call back from a job from which they were temporarily laid off.
 - c. Not in the Labor Force: People who are neither employed nor unemployed are considered to not be in the labor force. For example, someone who does not have a job and has not made an active effort to search for one in the past four weeks is counted as not in the labor force. (An active effort includes responding to ads, filling out applications, placing phone calls, etc. Just looking at classified ads in the newspaper does not count.)
 - d. All people who are counted as employed or unemployed are considered to be a part of the Civilian Labor Force. The Civilian Labor Force does not include people on active duty in the Armed Forces or anyone under the age of 16.
